Introduction

Welcome to our annual review for 2015-2016, and thank you for your continued support of The Network. This report covers the period from April 2015 to March 2016.

This has continued to be a difficult time for the cultural sector as a whole, and this has been reflected in the membership of the Network. Although 2015-2016 did see some members decide not to renew their subscriptions (a mix of budget pressures and staffing reductions), the majority of members renewed their subscriptions which have enabled libraries, museums, archives, and cultural & heritage organisations across the country to respond to social justice issues and to make a difference to individuals and groups in their communities – please see Appendix B for a reminder about ways of making the most of your subscription.

Our work

Key successes included:

- Producing newsletters for April 2015-March 2016
- Producing 30 Ebulletins for the period April 2015-March 2016
- Regularly adding events, resources and new features to the website¹
- Developing, running and participating in a number of courses and conferences.

Further information about these – and other – areas of work are in the report that follows.

Working towards social justice and developing approaches to community engagement are still very much live issues – in fact, some organisations have even started referring to ‘social exclusion’ again: it is increasingly clear that libraries, museums, archives and cultural & heritage organisations have a key role to play in this (despite the economic position), and The Network is contributing to the spread of good practice and the raising of our sector profile.

Finally, my thanks to all those who shared good practice, made enquiries, and generally contributed to The Network – please continue doing so!

My particular thanks also go to Julie Gibson (formerly Head of Libraries, Enfield) for being one of the counter-signatories for The Network’s bank account until March 2016; and to Carol Boswarthack and Madeline Barratt for taking on and continuing in this role.

The Network website statistics

Making a difference

As noted above, The Network makes a difference, including:

- Drawing together, highlighting and disseminating innovation and good practice (eg information about the ways in which the cultural sector can support refugees)
- Being active in the sector on behalf of members: adding to and widening the debate about libraries, museums, archives, cultural heritage organisations and social justice issues (eg in relation to provision for LGBTQ people, and for new arrivals)
- Working with Network members and across the sector to help develop strategy (eg in work with LGBTQ people)
- Campaigning and lobbying on behalf of the sector
- Giving advice and information, and sharing good practice from other Network members (eg web resources for supporting LGBTQ people; work with homeless people; work with older people – for an enquiry from Australia; tracking down a museum in London that wanted to work with prisoners; provision for Arabic-speaking communities)
- Giving support to colleagues (eg advice on finding information about looked-after children’s attainment; the needs for hearing loops in community libraries; examples of evidence-based librarianship; background social policy information for an archives studies student)
- Supporting people outside the sector (eg helping a funding officer find research and/or evidence to demonstrate the impact of public libraries; supporting a filmmaker looking for trans contacts)
- Linking the UK cultural sector’s social justice work to that abroad (eg in the US, Canada, Germany, and Australia)
- Someone leaving the Prisons JISCMail list in October 2015 emailed to comment:

“Most recently, as part of the continuing programme of work to develop the Six Steps approach, a series of workshops has been offered in several parts of the UK, including opportunities in Edinburgh, London and Cardiff.

The Six Steps Workshop programme has been offered in conjunction with The Network (an independent organisation which exists solely to tackle social exclusion in communities) over the past two years. Each workshop has followed a similar pattern and has been offered to around 50 participants at a time and, where possible, based in a library venue in one of the nine English regions, Wales or in Scotland.

At each event, agendas have included a background to the Six Steps offer and the reasons for its existence, a print-disabled speaker explaining the challenges that face people with sight loss and other disabilities and a

background to access technology to give simple solutions to common challenges. Working with both Royal National Institute of Blind People and with Action for the Blind, the workshop organiser, John Vincent, has been able to provide a varied experience which has shown participants how to make use of the access features of PCs, Apple products and other tablets and readers. Most important, it has given participants the opportunity to come together and talk about their individual experiences and challenges in their day-to-day work.

As the workshops have been supported both by the Chartered Institute of Library and Information Professionals and Share the Vision, costs have been minimised which, in view of recent reductions in many library service budgets, has meant more staff have been able to attend. Feedback from the face-to-face workshop events has been extremely positive and a further programme is planned for 2015-2016, once again in a partnership between Share the Vision and The Network. In the coming programme, the issues around digital access and the move towards self-service in both library terms and more generally in terms of engaging with both national and local government in the UK will be a high priority.”¹²

Appendix B: Making the most of your subscription

Member organisations and individuals use The Network to:

- Ensure that their services are well placed to meet national, regional and local objectives
- Draw on and share expertise and good practice
- Work with other Network members to benchmark services
- Keep up-to-date effectively with new developments across the social justice field, without having to read every new document themselves as the information has already been distilled for them
- Ensure that colleagues across their service are also able to keep up-to-date via targeted emails to their desk-tops
- Ensure value for money by being able to book places on Network courses and receive in-house training at reduced cost.

When a library (or museum or archive) service from a local authority joins The Network, this automatically confers membership on the **whole local authority**.

The benefits are that:

- Council departments can share knowledge about issues that matter to them, and your service is placed at the centre of this authority-wide information-sharing
- It's a cost-effective way of stretching limited resources (and, in addition, other Council departments could contribute towards the cost of the subscription)

- Related organisations within the local authority area, such as independent and District Council museums, archive collections, schools, and others, can also share this targeted information in an extremely effective way.

Some public library services forward the Newsletter and Ebulletin (as well as other emails from our elists) to targeted contacts across the Council (thereby ensuring that the library service is contributing to corporate targets and agendas), and have also subscribed key local authority staff to some of the elists. Information is also forwarded to contacts in the community.

They also regularly share updates on service developments with other Network contacts, and ask for advice and suggestions on service plans. In one authority, a contribution towards the cost of the annual subscription is received from other Council departments in recognition of the value of this information-sharing.
